IMPORTANT INFORMATION Administration of Medicines

If you wish school staff to administer medication to your child, parents must complete the consent form which can be obtained from the school office or on the school website (Information/School Forms). Staff will be unable to administer any medication (this includes Strepsils and similar throat lozenges) without the required form - a note in the diary or a letter will not be acceptable.

Staff are unable to administer aspirin or medicines containing ibuprofen unless they are prescribed by a doctor.

All medicines must be in their original box or container.

All prescribed medicines must be provided in the original container as dispensed by a pharmacist and include the instructions for administration.

In science we were learning about balancing objects and our task was to make a clown or a robot and balance it on your finger. First we needed to get the layout made and then we coloured in the templates with bright colours. After we had finished colouring in the templates we used weights to measure out 2 pieces of plasticine weighing 3.5 grams, these would be used to put in the hands of our clown or robot. We then glued both pieces of our template together putting the plasticine in both hands and a small piece on the nose. The glue was left to dry overnight so the following day we were able to test our balancing clowns on our fingers.



Year 5 Wessex Water

We arrived at just before 10am and the first thing we noticed was the smell, it was disgusting. Also there was dirty sewage water in the tanks and in the skips. There was rubbish everywhere.

The first lesson was horrible. The teacher made sewage soup, it was gross. She put body wash, shampoo, conditioner, coffee, cornflakes, milk, shaving foam, toothpaste, and some gross things you would find in the toilet, all in a bowl and stirred it up.

Next we got our coats on and went outside in groups. We had to wear high vis jackets. The lady took us round the whole site in a step by step tour. It took us about an hour to walk around the whole place. They sieved and filtered the sewage before the fine solids were separated by gravity in huge circular tanks. After that the dirty water is cleaned by live bugs before being zapped by UV light. They make the water clean enough to go in the river. It was very interesting to see the process.

After lunch we looked at activated sludge under a microscope. There were tiny creatures too small to see with a naked eye. They were moving around and some of them were eating the bacteria from the sludge.

Finally we had to carry out a scientific experiment. We had to sort out and test water samples. They were from the swimming pool, the rain and from the tap. We tested the acidity, the chlorine levels and hardness of the water. Overall the trip was fun and very interesting.
