

MEDICAL MAVERICKS

Students with an interest in Science and more specifically medicine, took part in a 'Medical Mavericks' workshop kindly organised by Ferndown Upper school.

The workshop provided students with information regarding the range of careers within the health sector and the various pathways they could take to achieve their chosen career.

The students took part in a range of medical procedures including, recording their own ECG, taking blood from a fake arm and practising keyhole surgery (I think we may have some budding surgeons!) as well as taking a look inside their own bodies with an ultrasound machine, a retina scan and a infrared vein scanner and projector!

The students seemed to have a great time and were complimented on their behaviour, attitude and overall Scientific knowledge. One of our year 5 students (Toby Richardson) was even the first student they'd met who could answer a particular question. He then went on to inform them that the information was in the literature they'd just been given – *the new year 5 curriculum 'how to be a scientist' observation lessons are paying off! Well done Toby!*

Thanks also goes to Mrs Stocks who kindly drove the EMS minibus and Mrs Smith, who offered to help out on the second workshop.





ROCKET DAY

Martin Haynes, his colleague and a number of our former students came over to EMS to host two Rocket Day workshops for a small number of our year 7 and year 5 students.



The day started with the year 7s braving the wet conditions out on the field to conduct a water rocket experiment. Their aim, to launch the rockets for maximum distance. They managed to have a Whale of a time, getting splattered by water and mud a like (sorry). We unfortunately had to retreat when the weather got worse and refused to show any signs of abating!

The fun continued in the lab where we were firing water film canister rockets using chemical reactions and simple mechanical air pressure. The students were a real credit to the school and gave a great impression of the quality of their Scientific understanding.

The next session involved year 5s and they were tasked with making paper rockets using a straw launching mechanism. They worked brilliantly using trial and error techniques and altering their designs accordingly.

At the end they competed to see which design would go the furthest. Brannon was the overall winner in a very close contest. I was however particularly impressed with the evaluation skills of the students as they identified that the test was not considered completely reliable as it didn't take into account lung capacity—Well done year 5s, budding rocket scientists already!!



I'M A SCIENTIST GET ME OUT OF HERE

I'm a Scientist Get Me Out of Here is where students get the chance to communicate with PHD scientists. Each time schools can enter a competition. They get put into a zone, this time Emmanuel students were put into the plant zone. This means that the students will be learning about plants, they will then get the opportunity to talk to PHD plant scientists.

In this after school club we have planted rocket lettuce seeds to see how radiation affects the growth of plants. One packet was radiated and the other not in a blind test. We did this because the ISS (International Space Station) are trying to grow plants on it, using radiation. We have also seen if salty water affects the mass of plants. We did this by using carrots. First we weighed the carrots (before they touched water), then put them in three beakers - one with plain water, the other with one tablespoon of salt and last one had two tablespoons of salt. After the carrots had been in the water for twenty minutes, we then weighed them to see any changes in mass. We did this experiment because in Mexico their soil is much saltier than in England. This means they end up using lots of water, and we wanted to see why. The salty water ended up making the carrots' water come out instead of in - osmosis - resulting in making the carrots super bendy.



The final experiment we did was to do with bacteria. To test this we all chose plants to grind and squish so its essence would come out. Once we had done this, we put the juice on a plate containing milk bacteria. After a week, we looked at them again and saw that only the garlic had killed the bacteria around it. All the other plants including onion, rosemary, parsley, basil, ginger, thyme and lavender, didn't get rid of the bacteria.


Having been fortunate enough to help to facilitate this process for the past few years - I must admit that I'm currently feeling rather melancholy as I will genuinely miss these pupils.
