Behaviour and Attitudes


Detentions

I thought it would be worth mentioning some of the activities arranged for the students who did not attend the French trip this week.

This week the students who remained in school during the French trip took part in some interesting and exciting activities during their Science lessons. On Monday we got the Bunsen burners to make natural dyes from food items and used them to dye some white squares of cotton.

On Tuesday we set up an experiment to show how different drinks might affect our teeth. We then made some balancing butterflies by shifting their centre of gravity.

On Wednesday we took the dyed cloth from Monday and using household items we colour-shifted the material, which the students could take home. If that wasn't enough a couple of lucky students took part in some demos, lighting some gas bubbles, experiencing hydrophobic materials, and watching a genie in a bottle.
